#### Upon completion of this course the students:

The course is the first focused treatment of an ancient Greek philosopher in the Department of Philology. Students have been offered an Introduction to Ancient Greek Philosophy in their first year and have also attended a course on Hellenistic and Roaman Philosophy in their third year of studies.

Upon successful fulfillment of the course requirements the student will be able to:

- 1. Understand Plato's fundamental philosophical positions as well as the arguments that have led to their espousal.
- 2. Recognize the intellectual background (Socrates, Sophists, Socratics, orators, philosophers of nature, dramatic poets) against which Plato created his philosophy.
- 3. Detect the literary techniques that Plato used in his dialogues.
- 4. Appreciate the mutual relationship between form and content in Plato's work.
- 5. Perceive the unity of a Platonic dialogue.
- 6. Analyze, and judge the validity of, philosophical arguments.
- 7. Compare ancient with modern ideas and practices about the fundamental issues of human life.
- 8. Evaluate the relevance (or otherwise) of Plato's thought to present concerns.
