- 5. Know the basic elements of literary (also, visual arts, film art etc.) production, as well as the philosophy of French Surrealism (utopia, humor etc.)
- 6. Compare and distinguish the peculiarities of Greek Surrealism.
- 7. Analyze the thematic, ideological content and morphology of Greek surrealistic writing (hybrids, prose poetry etc.) in comparison with the French one.
- 8. Present the ways through which the descendants benefited from surrealism.
